Receiving the head's report Reporting to stakeholders The role of the governing body can be summarised into three strands:

Strategic Direction

- Long term planning and direction of the school
- Promote the aims and ethos of the school
- Ensure the effective implementation of policies under which the school will operate

Accountability

- Accountable for the schools overall performance
- Ensure that the National Curriculum is delivered
- Agree the schools performance targets
- Responsibility for the school's budget and ensuring the best use of financial resources
- Handle complaints as part of the school complaints procedure
- Maintenance of school buildings

Critical Friend

- Hold the school to account
- Monitor and evaluate the performance of all pupils including those who are vulnerable.
- Being supportive but equally challenging.

Governing Body Powers

The governing body is recognized in law as a corporate body which means that it has a legal identity separate from that of its governors.

It also means that individual governors have no power or right to act on behalf of the governing body except where the whole governing body has delegated a specific duty to that individual. The governing body can also decide to delegate certain responsibilities to committees that it has established.

The school governors have overall legal and strategic responsibility for the school and are made up of four groups, Parent Governors elected by parents, an LEA governor appointed by Hertfordshire County Council, Staff Governors elected by staff and Co-opted governors appointed to bring specific skills and maintain and develop the schools links with the community.
